

### From the Vicarage .....

#### Dear Friends,

A recent survey has found that belief in God among UK adults has fallen by more than one quarter since the 1980s, and yet belief in life after death has remained almost unchanged in those four decades. The research was conducted by King's College, London, as part of its World Values Survey, exploring social, political, economic, religious, and cultural values in 90 countries.

In the UK, the views of a random sample of just over 3,000 adults from across the UK was taken in 2020, and this data was measured against 24 other countries and compared with results from 1981. The findings were published last month in a report, entitled "Lost Faith; the UK's changing attitudes towards religion".

1981, three-quarters of surveyed UK adults said that they believed in God, compared with just under half (49 per cent) in 2022. Just five countries had a lower percentage of belief in God: China (17 per cent), Sweden (35 per cent), Japan (39 per cent), South Korea (41 per cent), and Norway (46 per cent). Belief in heaven among the UK adults fell over the same period, but less dramatically, from 57 per cent to 41 per cent. The proportion of people believing in life after death has remained at about 45 per cent, actually rising to 47 per cent in the past few years.

Significantly, though, our cultural attachment to organised religion has continued to decline in the UK, even though belief in an afterlife is holding up strong. Reading a precis of the report, I found myself wondering what sort of God do people not believe

in, if many still hope for an afterlife? Can 'belief' precede faith? After all, we trust many things in life, before we discover that they are true, and can reasonably be relied upon. Is our general mistrust in institutions like the Church confused with our 'unbelief' in God? If our growth as human beings is a journey, how can we reach our destination without the journeying?

Notwithstanding the situation in the UK, two reassuring conclusions were drawn by the report:

- Firstly that, while the practice of organised religion in this country may be in decline, adherents, though fewer in number, are generally more dedicated in practice.
- Secondly, this international survey showed that, while religion in the West and in some countries with dictatorships was in decline, this was by no means a global phenomenon and indeed it was growing in many countries around the world.

I would like to finish this letter on an altogether more joyful and optimistic note.

On 2<sup>nd</sup> July, Fr Ryan was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop Philip at St George's Church, Chorley. I find it hard to believe that he has been with us for nearly a year, but in that time he has become a much loved member of the St Anne's 'family', and a trusted colleague. Please remember him in your prayers as he begins this next stage of his ministry among us.

### Fr Ryan's Ordination

Sunday 2nd July 2023. What a wonderful and memorable afternoon and evening this was in many different ways.

The Ordination must not be overshadowed by the journey to Chorley, but we cannot avoid mentioning it as it affected everyone who was travelling on the M6. The coach left at 4 pm from St Annes but did not arrive at St George's Church, Chorley until 6.40 pm. This was due to an earlier accident which, resulted in the closure of the M55 & M6 motorways. The coach was diverted through Preston, where the roads were gridlocked. Fr Ryan and Bishop Philip were also caught up in the traffic around Preston, but did arrive in time. However, it was agreed to delay the start of the service until 6.20 pm. When the coach finally arrived we were welcomed by Bishop Philip who paused the service to come out and greet everyone personally. The service was then restarted with Fr Glen being invited to read the Gospel.

Everything then proceeded as planned for the 'Liturgy of the Ordination'. Fr Ryan & Fr Jordan gave very strong responses to 'The Declarations'. Likewise the congregation strongly agreed, with the help, of God to support them in their ministry.

One of the most moving parts of the Ordination was when Fr Ryan & Fr Jordan prostrated themselves in front of the Bishop and the joint choirs of St George & St Anne sang 'Come, Holy Ghost, our Souls Inspire' followed by the Litany read by Revd Mike Print, the vicar of St George's.

The Mass continued with 'The Ordination Prayer' and 'The Laying on of Hands' by Bishop Philip and those priests who supported each ordinand. The ordinands were each given a copy of the Bible and then they were anointed on the palm of their hands. Fr Glen and Fr Mike presented their newly ordained priests with their vestments. This was followed by tumultuous applause as they were presented to family, friends and fellow priests who had come to support them at this very special time.

The final part of the Ordination service was 'The Liturgy of the Eucharist'.

Afterwards everyone was invited back to St George's Parish Rooms for a buffet supper with celebratory cake and drinks.

It was a wonderful evening filled with faith and love for two very special people. We send our thanks to Fr Mike and the people of the parish of St Georges, for their hospitality, and to Bishop Philip for his words of support and understanding with the unavoidable delays. Sadly we missed his sermon, but Ryan and his family heard his words.

We send our congratulations and above all, our prayers Fr Ryan as he continues his ministry among us and the people of St Annes.

### Fr Ryan's First Mass

After the trials and tribulations of Sunday's transport issues, we were delighted to be on home ground for Fr Ryan's first sacrificial offering of the Holy Mass, which coincided with the Feast of St Thomas the Apostle. Fr Ryan was supported by clergy from many parishes in the diocese, family and friends as he celebrated Mass for the first time.

During the Mass the lessons were read by Tracey Evans and Fiona Wilson. The Gospel was read by the Deacon of the Word, Fr Jean Kouacou, and the Deacon of the Sacraments was Fr Jonathan Roberts. Fr Nicholas Davis, Vicar of the parish of St Cuthbert's , Darwen, who had known Fr Ryan since his youth, gave the Homily, which provided us with some background information about our new priest!! Prayers of Intercession were read by Karen Kay. The Master of Ceremonies was Alfie Charlton, from St Christopher's, Blackpool. The hymns sung during the service were 'Glorious Things of Thee Are Spoken', 'Ye Watchers and Ye Holy Ones', 'Come, Risen Lord, and Deign to be Our Guest', 'Let All Mortal flesh Keep Silent', 'Soul of My Saviour, Sanctify My Breast' and 'Angel Voices Ever Singing'. After Communion the church choir gave a beautiful rendition of 'If You Love Me' by Thomas Tallis.

Towards the end of the service Fr Ryan presented his mother with a bouquet of 33 red roses, one for each year of his life, and also a Maniturgium, which was used to cleanse his hands, consecrated and made holy when the bishop anointed them with sacred chrism at his ordination. The Maniturgium, which represents the burial shroud of Christ that protected His sacred body, is given to the mother, because she was the first protector of the newly ordained priest, during his time in her womb. When the newly ordained priest's mother is called home to God, she is buried holding the Maniturgium so that all in Heaven and on Earth will know that she is the mother of a priest. On the last day when we are raised from the dead, she can present the Maniturgium to Christ the Lord and say, "my son too shared in your priesthood."

The service concluded with our very accomplished organist, Alistair MacKenzie, playing Toccata from Symphony No 5 by Charles-Marie Widor; this produced a spontaneous round of applause from the congregation. Immediately after the Mass photographs were taken and Fr Ryan offered first blessings to those wishing to receive them.

Susan McMahon had produced a menu for the finger buffet and asked the congregation to support her with donations of foods from the menu. The response was tremendous with a good variety of savoury and sweet items. Everyone appeared to have plenty to eat and the wine and prosecco flowed, but the fruit juice was also very popular! A couple of clergy informed us that they always enjoyed coming to St Annes because we always provide a good buffet; we are sure they were not disappointed on this occasion. A special thank you must go to Anna Hall for the fantastic cake she made for the celebration and to our flower ladies who created the beautiful floral arrangements for the buffet table and the flowers in church. Sincere thanks also go to everyone who contributed and helped on the evening.

Hopefully this will be an evening that Fr Ryan will remember for the rest of his life and we wish him well as he embarks on his ministry as a priest.

### Bishop Philip - Bishop of Blackburn

On Saturday 24th June, Rt Reverend Philip North was installed as the tenth Bishop of Blackburn.

The service was attended by 2000 people from across the county, including many civic, community and faith leaders.

During the vibrant and colourful installation service at Blackburn Cathedral, Bishop Philip North lived out the pledge he made when he was initially announced as the tenth Bishop of Blackburn in January. This was to place children and young people at the heart of all we do as a diocese. From the very moment he arrived in the Cathedral, until the end of the service, it was the voices of the young people who could be heard above all others.

One of the key elements of the service was that all children who were present were invited to a very special 'Messy Installation' downstairs in the cathedral crypt. It is thought to be the first time that such an event, which was specifically for children, has been held at the same time as an actual installation.

The children's event was organised by the Diocesan Board of Education. It was a fun variation of the well-known 'Messy Church' that has grown in popularity in recent years, and it allowed the children present to learn about the Bible and Jesus through play and craft.

Meanwhile the main service, 'The Eucharist of the Holy Spirit', was sung by Blackburn Cathedral Choir alongside the Cathedral Youth Choir. As the guests arrived, children from local schools were also singing.

At precisely 2 pm, Bishop Philip, as is the tradition for a new Diocesan Bishop, knocked loudly on the West Door of the Cathedral with an ancient Saxon hammer before being allowed to enter. He was met by three young people from St Luke's Church in Blackburn, who offered greetings and led the moment of welcome, along with the entire congregation who had turned to face the West Door. Later in the service the first reading from the Bible was delivered by young people from All Saints, New Longton.

Hymns enjoyed during the service included, 'All People that on Earth do Dwell', 'O Breath of Life', 'And Can It Be' and 'Crown Him with Many Crowns'.

Throughout the service, children continued to be at the forefront of proceedings. Towards the end of the service Bishop Philip led a 'Messy Installation' procession through the Cathedral, with the youngsters all wearing colourful home-made mitres. The Bishop also wore a stunning, purple cloak made for him by the children during the 'Messy Installation'.

Notable figures who attended the service included the Lord Lieutenant of Lancashire, Rt Hon Lord Shuttleworth KG KCVO and Lady Shuttleworth, as well as the Speaker of the House of Commons and MP for Chorley, the Rt Hon Sir Lindsay

Hoyle. Other guests were the High Sheriff of Lancashire, Mr David Taylor CBE, the Venerable Joshua Skee and Rev Martin Stützer (representing our Diocesan links from South Africa and Germany), alongside many Mayors and Mayoresses, council leaders, faith and community representatives.

From the Diocese, alongside Bishop Philip, was Rt Rev Dr Jill Duff, Anglican Bishop of Lancaster, the Dean of Blackburn, the Very Rev Peter Howell-Jones, the Venerable Mark Ireland, Archdeacon of Blackburn, the Venerable David Picken, Archdeacon of Lancaster, Dean of Women's Ministry, Rev Anne Beverley, the Bishop's Adviser on UKME issues and Deacon for the Installation Service, Rev Sarah Gill, and many clergy and their parishioners from across Lancashire.

As well as clergy and civic processions, those in attendance and watching online via the livestream also witnessed the Oaths of Allegiance by Bishop Philip to His Majesty the King and to the Archbishop of York, the 'Installation' itself when the new Bishop takes his episcopal seat (the 'Cathedra') in the Cathedral and also the Presentation, when Bishop Philip was presented as the new Bishop of Blackburn to the congregation.

Speaking in his sermon about the importance of placing children, young people and our schools at the 'very heart of our common life', Bishop Philip said:

"The Church often engages in ministry to the young as a kind of insurance policy. We do it to make the adults feel a bit better about themselves because it suggests the church may have a future. But the desire for institutional survival is the wrong starting point. The right starting point is the Gospel song all ages can sing together. We want young people to be inspired by the person of Jesus. This wonderful current generation, so many of them in this cathedral today, is a searching one. They are asking profound and challenging questions about purpose, about relationships, about the future of the planet. Christians believe the goal of that searching is found in relationship with Jesus. So let's create the spaces where we can have those conversations."

### Bishop Philip added:

"Imagine every parish engaging in ministry to the young. Imagine a network of children and youth workers supporting that ministry across Lancashire. Imagine too, an even closer partnership between churches and our amazing family of church schools for the benefit of the young. But equally, we want young people to inspire the church. So, let's create the places where young people can pray, worship, sing and lead."

As well as an emphasis on children and young people at the heart of all we do, during the sermon Bishop Philip also placed the spotlight on social justice and the importance of proclaiming the Gospel to the whole county of Lancashire.

He previously declared all three as key aims to be 'labouring tirelessly' for in the years to come when he was first announced as the new bishop in January this year.

After the service finished, clergy from across the diocese gathered for one of the largest ever group pictures of Lancashire clergy ever taken (see below). The entire congregation was then invited to a community picnic in the Cathedral grounds. Every guest was given their own beautifully presented 'picnic box' with delicious crafted sandwiches and homemade scones with clotted cream & jam.

Bishop Philip chose two charities, SportsReach and Ambassadors Football UK for donations following the service. Both charities seek to equip churches in sports ministry as well as engage directly in using sport as a tool to reach people for Christ. They work predominantly with children and young people but do have something for all ages and work in Lancashire as well as across the globe.

### Ringing for the King

I am a bell ringer at St Annes Parish Church in St Annes-on-the-Sea. At our Church's Christmas Tree Festival in December 2022 we advertised an opportunity for anyone who was interested to learn to "Ring for the King". We were delighted when one of the parents from our church school, Shaun, came forward expressing an interest to learn. At almost the same time we had a referral from the national "Ring for the King" campaign from a lady called Carole. So just before Christmas 2022 they had their first lesson. I had just completed The Association of Ringing Teachers Module 1 course and these were my first pupils. Shaun and Carole made fantastic progress, achieving their LtR Level 1 in February 2023 and in the process enabling me to achieve my M1 accreditation as a teacher of bell handing.

In February 2023 we had two more referrals from the national campaign. So Fay and Jane started their lessons together too. It's been great to see all our new ringers encouraging and supporting each other as they progressed with their bell handling. Fay and Jane have also made great progress and were just starting to learn how to put both strokes together before the Coronation weekend. The progress of all the ringers has been even more impressive as our bells were removed for the long planned refurbishment just before Easter. So we had four keen "Ring for the King" learners and no bells for them to ring! Tower Captain Stuart Newton arranged for us all to visit other local towers and also continued teaching Jane and Fay on "Edwin" our Saxilby Simulator.

On the Big Day all four of our new ringers did indeed "Ring for the King", with Jane & Carole ringing at Bispham All Hallows and Shaun & Fay at St Cuthbert's in Lytham. They all did really well, thoroughly enjoyed the experience and felt a great sense of achievement.

They are all a wonderful addition to our band here at St Annes and we look forward to their continued progress over the coming months.

### Bell Project - Update - Bell Tower

It has been a busy few weeks for the bellringers, preparing the bell chamber ready for the return of the bells. This has included removing decades of cobwebs and in-blown dust and sand, cleaning down the ironwork, checking that the bolts are tight and then priming and painting the ironwork. An extension was added to the existing frame in order to house one of the two new extra bells and adapting the existing frame to hold three bells where there used to be two.

Thank you to bell ringers Gerald, Gareth, Jim W, Jim A, Carole, Ellis, Stuart, Monica and Roy & Gill from the Wednesday Team, who all helped with this work and supported Steve from Taylor's Bell Foundry.

This wonderful team effort, with everyone giving many hours of free labour, has enabled a significant reduction in cost to the church's overall bill for the restoration work. As you can see below there has been an amazing transformation!

At the time of writing (23rd June) we are almost ready to receive the new bells and we are waiting for a confirmation date from Taylors for the work to commence. We are hopeful that it will be the middle of July. It will take two weeks to hang all the bells once they arrive on site, so we are hoping the work will be complete in time for the bells to ring out in celebration of the church's 150th Anniversary in August.

### Bell Project - Update - Casting Trip

On Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> June we organised a trip to Taylor's Bell Foundry in Loughborough. Our visit enabled us to watch four of the new bells being cast. This was a great experience and thoroughly enjoyed by everyone who made the journey for this momentous occasion.

The processes involved for casting the bells, making the wheels, headstocks etc has barely changed in hundreds of years, so it was like stepping back in time to a Victorian workshop, apart from a few power tools here and there!

After the bells were cast Fr Glen blessed them.

Following the casting we were given a tour of the workshop where they make the wheels, stay & sliders, headstocks and where the bells are tuned. We also saw where they test each completed bell.

We were fortunate enough to see the new wheels as part of the tour as well as the bell gifted by Jim Andrews, our PCC Secretary. This had previously been cast along with another bell several weeks previously. Jim and his wife Val had visited Taylors to witness the casting of those bells along with our Patron Lady Katharine Bryan and Fr Martin Daniels, who is the President of the Lancashire Association of Change Ringers.

The ringers on the trip also had time for a short ring on the peal of 12 bells at the factory. Well we had to make sure we got a quick "grab" didn't we!

### St Anne & St Joachim Feast Day - 26th July

Saint Anne is a special saint in the Christian faith, traditionally recognised as the mother of Mary, who later became the mother of Jesus. Saint Anne's story is not mentioned in the Bible, but it has been passed down in apocryphal texts.

Their prayers were answered when an angel appeared to them and told them that they would have a daughter named Mary. Mary grew up to be a kind-hearted and faithful girl who was chosen by God to become the mother of Jesus.

Saint Anne played an important role in raising Mary and teaching her about faith and love for God. She taught Mary how to pray and instilled in her strong values and virtues.

Even though there are no specific stories about Saint Anne in the Bible, she is highly revered by Christians around the world. Many people believe that she intercedes on their behalf when they pray for help or guidance and she is considered a patron saint of mothers and grandmothers.
