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
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From the Curate ... A Mars a Day ...

Dear Friends,

As I write this letter we are in middle of our week of the celebration for 150th anniversary of the church. For some reason I suddenly found myself thinking about the bells and I had a sudden flashback to the old television adverts for the Mars bar. Many of you will remember the slogan and tune that goes "A Mars a day helps you work, rest and play."

had to look this up but, apparently, this was a fabulous slogan first adopted for the chocolate bar in the 1960s. 1997, dropped but in re-introduced briefly ten years later with a video of bellringing. I'm sure you must have seen that, but if not, it's available on YouTube!

The premise of the video was that eating a Mars bar aided exercise. I am sure that nutritionists might dispute that but, nevertheless, the original slogan has remained memorable. We all need work, rest and play and getting the balance right is important for our physical and mental health. None of us can go flat out at work without risking burnout and none of us can just rest without losing the ability to

move and be productive. If life was just play I'm not sure what we might achieve in life. However many of us find it difficult to get the balance right.

What about our spiritual wellbeing? How often do we wonder if we are achieving the right balance there, or realise we are ignoring our spiritual needs completely? Jesus knew how to

withdraw often and find space and time to 'just be', to connect with God and to pray. He knew the importance of getting the balance right. In doing so he was better equipped and able to be there for others to help them achieve inner peace and rest.

He said, "Come to me, all you who are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." (Matthew 11:28-30)

This August, why not re-evaluate your "work, rest and pray" balance and see if any adjustments need to be made?

Transfiguration - A Glimpse of Glory

It was a time when Jesus' ministry was popular, when people were seeking Him out. However on this day, He made time to take Peter, James and John, His closest disciples, up a high mountain. In the fourth century, Cyrillic of Jerusalem identified it as Mount Tabor (and there is a great church up there today), but others believe it more likely to have been one of the three spurs of Mount Hermon, which rises to about 9,000 feet, and overlooks Caesarea Philippi.

High up on the mountain, Jesus was suddenly transfigured before His friends. His face began to shine as the sun, His garments became white and dazzling. Elijah and Moses, of all people, suddenly appeared, and talked with Him. A bright cloud overshadowed the disciples.

Peter was staggered, but, enthusiast that he was — immediately suggested building three tabernacles on that holy place, one for Jesus, one for Moses, and one for Elijah. However God's 'tabernacling', God's dwelling with mankind, does not any longer depend upon building a shrine. Instead it depends on the presence of Jesus. The cloud covered them, and a Voice spoke out of the cloud, saying that Jesus was His beloved Son, whom the disciple should 'hear'. God's dwelling with mankind depends upon our listening to Jesus.

Then, just as suddenly, it is all over. What did it mean? Why Moses and Elijah? Well, these two men represent the Law and the Prophets of the Old Covenant, or Old Testament. Now they are handing on the baton, if you like: for both the Law and the Prophets found their true and final fulfilment in Jesus, the Messiah.

Why on top of a mountain? In Exodus we read that Moses went up Mount Sinai to receive the sacred covenant from Yahweh in the form of the Ten Commandments. Now Jesus goes up and is told about the 'sealing' of the New Covenant, or New Testament of God with man, which will be accomplished by His coming death in Jerusalem.

That day made a lifelong impact on the disciples. Peter mentions it in his second letter, 2 Peter 1:16–19, invariably the reading for this day. The Eastern Churches have long held the Transfiguration as a feast as important as Christmas, Epiphany, Ascension and Pentecost, but it took a long time for the West to observe the Transfiguration. The feast starts appearing from the 11th and 12th centuries, and the Prayer Book included it among the calendar dates, but there was no liturgical provision for it until the 19th century.



Fr Ryan Reflects on his Ordination & First Mass

On Sunday 2nd July I was ordained a priest by Bishop Philip North and what an experience it turned out to be. It was a wonderful occasion which was not ruined by the delayed start or the hiatus in the middle, due to the crash on the M6. You know what they say, "there is no point crying over spilt milk".

The day was one I had been very much looking forward to for some time. You could almost feel the excitement of having so many people around me, it was so powerful & infectious!

People kept asking me if I was nervous but my honest reply was that I wasn't - I was just so happy. It was an extension of the experience I had on retreat, which simply confirmed that it was the right way ahead. I was moved to see so many familiar faces at both St Georges, Chorley for my ordination and at St Anne's for my first Mass. Some people had travelled a considerable distance, and it really meant a great deal to see you all.

During my retreat I was reading a book by Pope Benedict called "Milestones" in which he reflected on his ordination to the priesthood. "I learned first hand how earnestly people wait for a priest," he said, "how they long for the blessing that flows from the power of the sacrament. The point was not [the priests]. In us they saw persons who had been touched by Christ's mission and had been empowered to bring His nearness to [all] . . . we ourselves were not the point . . .". Whilst lying prostrate during the Litany of the Saints I couldn't help but think that it reminds us all that everything comes from God and we can fearlessly put our trust in Him. This sentiment was clearly going through my heart at my own ordination.

The grace of God flowed freely and abundantly on everyone there, and not just for Fr Jordan and myself as we became priests. I could see it so clearly on the faces of those around us. Looking at all the people I thought to myself, "This is your ordination, too. It's the prayers and support of good people like you that helped me to walk up these steps to be ordained and it's for all of you that I'm walking down". I could not have been more grateful to you all and especially to Almighty God. I could not have done it alone.

I think one of the most moving parts of the ceremony for me was the Laying on of Hands. This is really the most solemn moment of the Rite of Ordination. The bishop ordains us by placing his hands on our head and invoking the Holy Spirit on the new priest. That moment when Bishop Philip placed his hands on my head really was the most profound, exhilarating and humbling experience. I have truly never known such joy. Following the bishop, all the other priests who were present did the same. It's an incredibly beautiful symbol of unity and brotherhood.

Many people have asked what it was that I presented my mother with at my first Mass. I presented my mother with thirty-three red roses, one for each year of my life she so freely gave me.

Sunday School

Discussions have been taking place for several weeks now with regard to the re-launching of Sunday School. Invitations were sent out via the usual channels, Pew Sheet, Facebook, magazine, website and Heyhouses School & Nursery. Several people came forward to express their interest in both attending Sunday School and also a willingness to be part of a team who would prepare and deliver the sessions.

As we go to press, there are further meetings planned over the coming weeks to sort out rotas, DBS, themes etc.

The decisions which have been made to date are as follows:

- It will revert back to being called Sunday School
- We will meet twice a month on the 2nd & 4th Sundays
- It will start at 10:15 am and children will be brought into church after the sermon, during The Peace
- It is planned to begin on Sunday 8th October, which is Harvest Sunday
- Initially the age group will be planned for 2-3 to 5 year olds
- The DBS process is already underway for a number of volunteers
- The official paperwork is being prepared in consultation with the safeguarding officer
- A First Aid course will be arranged
- There will be a rota in place for volunteers to deliver the sessions

There is a very positive vibe amongst those involved in re-launching Sunday School, but also amongst the volunteers and those who have expressed an interest in attending.

Once everything is in place, adverts and invitations will again be posted in the usual places. So please encourage anyone who is interested in attending to pick up the application forms, these will be available later in the month OR if you or someone you know is interested in being part of this exciting project then please let us know by emailing, either the parish office or the magazine team.

I also gave my mother a Maniturgium, which was used to cleanse my hands, consecrated and made holy when the bishop anointed them with sacred chrism at my ordination. The Maniturgium is a simple white piece of linen that represents the burial shroud of Christ that protected His sacred body during His three days in the tomb. The Maniturgium is given to the mother, because she was the first protector of the newly ordained priest, during his time in her womb. The Maniturgium is a reminder to the people of God of His love and protection, especially towards His priests. When the newly ordained priest's mother is called home to God, she is buried holding the Maniturgium so that all in Heaven and on Earth will know that she is the mother of a priest. On the last day when we are raised from the dead, she can present the Maniturgium to Christ the Lord and say, "my son too shared in your priesthood."

In the days that have followed my ordination I have had little time to reflect. In some ways, I've been pinching myself ever since; part of me can hardly believe it has happened.

However, presiding or concelebrating at Mass each day has been a great joy and privilege.

Let me take this opportunity to thank all of you who have supported me on this journey, and a huge thank you for your generosity of gifts and cards. I know a whole host of people have been praying for me and I am really grateful for that.

Arts Week

The 150th anniversary celebrations began in style on July 10th, when our Arts Week was launched with Dr Harvey & The Philistans. They entertained their audience with an interesting mix of songs from across the county, from 'Little Sir Echo', one about 'tripe' through to a very moving piece based on letters found which were written by Harry, one of the Preston Pals. They narrated the history of the songs, as researched by Dr Harvey, although we do think some of the comments were 'tongue in cheek'! They were highly entertaining and encouraged much audience participation. It was a really enjoyable evening.

Tuesday saw sketches and songs from members of St Annes Parish Operatic Society and the Emily Laws School of Acting, and piano performances by the very talented Thomas Pawson. In the second half of the evening we were entertained by Sounds Right, a seven piece function band, directed by Chris Andrews, the musical director of SAPOS. We were certainly entertained during the course of the evening by a variety of styles.

On Wednesday evening the church was full as we welcomed The Lidun Singers, under the direction of Alistair MacKenzie, and accompanied by Dr Kevin Morgan on organ and piano. Alistair, in his eloquent style, explained a little about each item of the very mixed programme. We enjoyed music and song ranging from 'Hail, Holy Queen' from 'Sister Act' to 'Zadok the Priest'. Kevin and Alistair also played a duet on the piano, 'The Arrival of the Queen of Sheba', and Kevin played 'Crown Imperial' by William Walton on the organ. The church was filled with beautiful music all evening.

On Thursday the church was almost bursting at the seams once again as we welcomed Heyhouses School Choir. The children were very well supported by family and friends as they entertained us with a selection of songs from two children's musicals, 'Jonah-Man Jazz' and 'Samson & Delilah'; their young voices sang out with maturity beyond their years. Mr MacKenzie has been working with the children over recent weeks, encouraging them to use their voices correctly. This included learning breathing techniques, pronunciation and vocal projection and above all standing still! The hard work had certainly paid off as they sang with great confidence.

Alongside the school choir, our own church choir entertained the audience beautifully. They sang five anthems and motets including Ave Verum, Jesu Joy of Man's Desire and Jubilate Deo. It was a very contrasting programme, but one which was well received by everyone in church.

Our church was filled with the resounding sound of brass instruments on Friday, when Intrada Brass returned after 27 years. Several of the group are the original members. They played a varied programme including, 'Swing Low, Sweet Chariot', 'North of England Folk Songs', dance music from the 1500 & 1700's and traditional brass music. The instrumental brass was interspersed with several solo pieces played on the organ by Alistair MacKenzie and the audience were also treated to brass solos. It was another truly memorable evening.

Finally, on Saturday, The Blue Magnolia Jazztet made a welcome return. Again the audience was treated to a variety of different musical pieces. The programme included a variety of pieces from Just Friends, Sweet Georgia Brown to The Flintstones, Pennies from Heaven, & It Don't Mean a Thing.

During the week several local artists displayed their talents by exhibiting their drawings and paintings. This was a really successful week enjoyed by many people.

Spiritual Disciplines - Rest



Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest.' (Matthew 11:28).

Today, the spiritual discipline of rest is a challenging one. We are pressured to cram more and more activities into fewer hours. This has been described as 'hurry sickness' and is an enemy of our spiritual life. August is a month for resting, and so is a good time to look at this discipline.

God instituted the discipline of rest in the creation of the world. He created everything in six days and rested on the seventh (Gen 2:3). He instituted the Sabbath, a weekly day of rest (Lev 23:3). However, it is helpful to draw a distinction between busyness and being hurried. Busyness is an outward condition, while hurry is about our inner state, resulting from too many competing priorities. Jesus was often busy but never hurried! What questions should we be asking about getting more rest?

Balancing Rest and Work: What is a helpful rhythm of work and rest in our lives? How can we take seriously the Sabbath principle of having one day a week to rest and not work? How might we use our time differently eg taking a long walk or having an unhurried conversation with a friend?

Using Our Leisure Time Creatively: When we actually take a break we often end up simply watching TV, surfing the net, shopping unnecessarily or eating when we are not hungry! Can we choose leisure activities that really refresh us? It's not a case of more leisure time, but using the time we have more creatively.

'The solution to an over busy life is not more time. It's to slow down and simplify our lives around what really matters.'

Light refreshments will be available.

The bells will be raised and fitted in the two weeks following the Anniversary Mass, week beginning 7th August, so hopefully we will be ringing again towards the end of August. We are really looking forward to ringing and hearing the sounds of our wonderful new bells.

St Clare of Assisi - 11th August



In the year 1212 Clare, the 18-year-old daughter of a local Count, heard a young preacher called Francis. A few years earlier he had caused a sensation in the centre of the town where they both lived, Assisi in Italy, by stripping himself of his wealthy clothes and declaring that from now on he would live the life of a peasant. This, he said, was in obedience to the call of Christ, for whom the poor were 'blessed' and the rich were in peril of judgment.

Francis gathered a group of seven men prepared to embrace what he called 'joyful poverty' for Christ's sake, but that day he was to enlist a female disciple. 'You are a chosen soul from God', he told Clare, when she expressed her eagerness to embrace the same strict rule as his male followers.

In due course, after a period in a Benedictine convent, Clare and her sister Agnes moved into the church of St Damiano, which Francis and his friends had restored, and gathered there a group of like-minded women. Eventually Francis made Clare the abbess of a religious Order, at first called the 'Order of Poor Ladies', eventually, and universally, to be known as the 'Poor Clares'. Unable to operate an itinerant ministry like the men, Clare's sisters concentrated on a life of prayer and simplicity. In fact, their dedication to poverty was such that it affected the health of many of them.

Francis and Clare remained friends and colleagues over the next 14 years in this remarkable movement of renewal and mission. During the preceding century (as we can learn from Chaucer, among others) the religious Orders had in many cases substituted indulgence for discipline. Francis and Clare found this scandalous, and despite opposition from high places, set out to demonstrate that an effective Christian message required an appropriate Christian life-style. For them, poverty was not a burden but a joy – a release from the delusions of power and ambition. Their witness made an enormous impact on the poor people of Umbria and beyond, who saw an authenticity in their lives which spoke as eloquently as their words.

Clare helped to nurse Francis through his final illness, which lasted several years. She lived for 27 years after his death, like him suffering from the effects of long years of strict austerity. She died in 1253 and was canonised two years later. She is buried in the basilica of St Clare in Assisi, a few hundred yards from the basilica of St Francis. In life they proclaimed the same message of sacrificial love and service, and in their deaths they were not divided.

We remember St Clare on 11th August.

What is Your Next Step?

Does this summer spell the end of school, college, or even a job, for you? Then congratulations are in order: you have completed a significant step!

Now it is time to consider your next step. The dictionary defines 'step' as a physical movement that advances you in a desired direction. You take a 'step' forward in order to get somewhere specific, not just to stop yourself falling flat on your face. Each 'step', however small, can take you towards a specific goal.

The Bible reflects this. It is filled with the metaphors of stepping, walking, running and goals, pilgrimages, journeys, all to describe the years of our lives.

When we were babies, we clung to our parents' hands as we learned how to take our first steps. They stayed right by us, to keep us from falling, and to steer us in the right direction. As adults, the Bible tells us that a successful journey through all of life is based on how near we walk to God – and let Him guide us in the steps we should take.

Choosing your next step in life this year is important. The good news is that you need not do it on your own. The Bible makes clear that in God, you have a divine 'life coach'. He knows you perfectly – and He has a plan for your life. Most of all this involves a personal relationship with Him.

We've all seen toddlers staggering towards danger, ignoring their parents' cries of warning. We've all seen adults making a mess of their lives. They are ignoring their personal divine Shepherd, Guide, Teacher and Helper.

A baby learns to walk safely by listening to its parents. We learn what God's will is for us through daily reading of His Word, in the Bible, and in obeying what we read.

For when God guides us, He does not hand down a divine map of our lives. His guidance is more like that of a torch – light for our daily path.

God's final 'step' for you is that you should know, enjoy, and glorify Him forever. Throughout our lives, we are to be taking small daily steps towards the Eternal City and He will see that we reach our final goal.

Meanwhile, the Lord wants you to succeed in the earthly goals that He has for you! Ask God to be your guide and helper as you take your next step.
